Kitten and Puppy Season Underway

As 2023, our 26th year begins, we are off to a busy kitten and puppy season.

Goats Galore

On February 19, 2023, Live and Let Live Farm Rescue received a call from a man in urgent need of someone to rescue 11 pregnant, Nigerian dwarf goats. He and his wife are homeless and she is very ill; therefore, they could no longer care for their animals.

Several LLLF volunteers immediately traveled to Barnstead, NH, and rescued the goats. Upon arrival at LLLF, the goats were placed into quarantine and fed. Unfortunately, one goat was in labor and lost her kid before arriving at the rescue.



We will soon have a large herd of goats and their kids since goats often have twins.



Bebe's Tale



Bebe is a 13-year-old, pregnant Lab mix rescued by Live and Let Live Farm volunteers.

One morning she woke her owner who noticed that she was immersed in blood and fluids. They were homeless and requested our help to care for Bebe.

LLLF volunteers brought Bebe to a veterinarian who confirmed pregnancy with a sonogram that showed 4-6 puppies. She was diagnosed with UTI and parasitic infections. Bebe also tested positive for heartworm, which further complicated her pregnancy. These conditions would be challenging for a young, pregnant dog, but overwhelming for a dog of her advanced age.

A few weeks later, Bebe had her first puppy at 5 am and the second was not born until noon. She did not have the strength to deliver any more.

An ultrasound showed two more puppies waiting to be born. Therefore, she needed an emergency C-section to save them. Bebe was exhausted after her lengthy ordeal, but quickly showed loving, maternal instincts.



Bebe's family has since grown to seven puppies. A dog with eight puppies was killed by a car and five did not survive. Volunteers introduced the three remaining puppies to Bebe who quickly accepted them as her own.

Senior Bebe has a long road ahead of her, but with our continued care, she will get the loving, forever home in the future that she deserves.
